Workshop content	<p>Outcome Harvesting is the product of ten years of experience in developmental, formative and summative evaluations of three dozen innovative interventions that aimed to influence social change. These projects, programs and organizations operated, to a greater or lesser degree, in dynamic, complex circumstances in which at the time of their planning, the relationships of cause and effect between what the intervention will do and what will be the results were substantially unknown. Thus, conventional evaluation approaches to assess performance and results against planned activities and objectives were inappropriate. Outcome Harvesting is an alternative way to generate credible evidence with which to draw conclusions about the merit or worth in order to both be accountable and learn from experience. Using exercises with a simulated case study, participants will spend 60% of the workshop doing exercises in small groups as a means of working through the six Outcome Harvesting steps.</p>
